Friendship Trail Bridge

Timeline: Following the Friendship Trail Bridge Info Session this evening, Council will consider awarding the RFP for the construction of the Friendship Trail Bridge.

Project Background: The Friendship Trail Bridge is a key component of the Friendship Trail route, which is part of the Sea to Sky Trail and Trans Canada Trail network. The aim of the Friendship Trail and Bridge is to provide a linear, safe connection between the Village, Plateau neighbourhood, future recreation site and Lil'wat Nation.

The construction of the Friendship Trail is being managed by the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District. The project management of the Friendship Trail Bridge is being overseen by the Village of Pemberton.

Project Details: The scope of the project includes the design and installation of a pedestrian, cycling and equestrian bridge on the south side of the Lillooet River, adjacent to Highway 99.

Friendship Trail Bridge Funding & Requirements

2012

Gas Tax, Regionally Signficant Projects

Funder Requirements: Must lead towards reduced greenhouse gas emissions, cleaner air or cleaner water; Be larger in scale or regional in impact. Project needed to be endorsed and supported by Council, SLRD and member municipalities.

2014

Innergex Renewable Energy

Funder Requirements: Preference for a project that provides benefits for the Village, Area C and Lil'wat Nation.

Funder Requirements: Eligible projects include those that encourage transportation cycling by accelerating the development of new cycling infrastructure. The focus of the BikeBC program is on cycling for transportation purposes.

Friendship Trail Bridge 2013 Consultation Summary

On April 3, 2013, the Village of Pemberton hosted a community input session to present the pros and cons of 6 potential crossing sites and to determine which crossing(s) the community preferred. Approximately 40 members of the public were in attendance.

Crossing options were: Clover Road Extension Crossing, CN Rail Crossing, Pemberton Farm Rd W Crossing, Fraser Connector Crossing, Highway 99 Crossing and North Arm Crossing.

A survey was circulated at the meeting, and online for the public to list their preferences and provide comments on the alignment options. 133 responses were received.

Highway 99 Crossing (38.5%) and North Arm Crossing (36.9%) were the top choices for a bridge crossing, with Pemberton Farm Road West Crossing as the least preferred (4.1%). Comments were recorded and are listed below for the top two preferences.

Highway 99 Crossing PROS included:

- direct route
- high visibility (safer)
- well-lit for evening travel
- inexpensive
- already used as commuter connection
- fewest elevation changes
- tourists using trail to D'Arcy come close to town and are more likley to stop

Highway 99 Crossing CONS included:

- potential traffic accidents
- too far from downtown and trails
- vehicle conflicts with skittish horses
- why bother when the highway bridge is already there
- not as scenic for tourists

North Arm Crossing PROS included:

- quiet
- shortest route
- potential new trail on east side that would avoid steep grades at rail crossing
- links bike & pedestrian use for Plateau, Mount Currie and Business Park more directly
- access to west side beach
- decent access to mountain bike trails
- completes the Valley Loop trail with acquisition of other right of ways

North Arm Crossing CONS included:

- private property crossing
- bridge crossing expensive
- no safety lighting
- large span (standalone bridge structure, less cost effective)
- CN Rail issues
